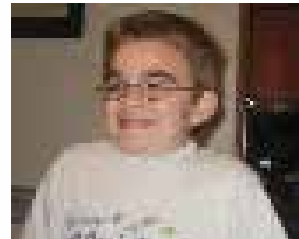

If Josh wanted to skateboard, climb a tree, etc., we would let
him. If he broke an arm or such, we would take him to the
hospital like we did with the other boys. We would not give
him meds unless he absolutely had to have them, as they all

have side effects. Until the last three years of his life, he got very little meds. He was hyper, but we chose to deal with it, redirect, repeat. lol

We put him in Special Olympics and horse riding therapy.

He loved people, loved to hug and kiss. When he threw things, we got on him, told him to be nice, taught him manners, made him apologize, not afraid to discipline. They understand more than one thinks. Some things we had to modify or do for special needs. We went camping, went on a boat, took him on a jet ski and golf cart. He loved anything to ride. He not only taught us things, such as loving unconditionally and to have more patience, but I have seen him transform others, ones that were being hateful/ugly, Josh would hug them or kiss them or just touch their face, and they either cried or laughed. When he started regressing, I stayed ahead of the game, foreseeing what to come and set in place what he needed. It was challenging with Josh, but an honor to take care him, and his daddy and I got to hold him and take care of him until he took his last breath.

We are a faith-based family. Josh loved church as well.

Through Josh's life, we have gained three daughter-in-laws and seven grandchildren. They all loved Josh as well. They and the grandkids played, loved, and snuggled with him. They would read him books, get in bed with him, some of the

grandkids slept with him and watched TV. We were told by many doctors that letting him be a kid as much as possible helped him in so many ways, instead of being so scared to let him do things, this in itself was an honor to be told that. At every appointment, doctors were surprised at how well Josh had done.

We were told God only gives Special Kids and adults to Special People that He knows will take good care of them. This I believe; not everyone can do what Special Needs parents do.

Josh left this world and us in April 2022, a whole week it took him to pass, struggling to breathe, but he looked everyone in the eyes. There were so many that came to be with him and talk to him, hold his hand, snuggle in bed, or hold him. And to finally let go into the arms of his Lord. As all these kids/adults, they are warriors, fighters. This we believe because these types of children/adults sit right beside God. They are given to us to make us stronger, to learn more patience, to persevere, to find faith, to love deeper, and so much more. We made sure we took every second, minute, hour to make so many memories. Long before Josh's passing, years before, I asked people to take pictures, no matter how raw, how much they thought it inappropriate, during his passing, viewing, funeral, ones did...and what a blessing.
